

WE SAY GOODBYE TO JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH



March 28, 1933 ~ April 24, 2023

With sad hearts, we said goodbye to John Hollingsworth, who passed away on April 24, 2023. John served as a CMD product sales and service manager for Bucyrus-Erie and traveled all over the world. John was a long time member of the Bucyrus Quarter Century Club and Bucyrus[®] Oldtimers Association. He served as editor of our previous newsletter, "Just Plain Folks", from September of 1999 until December of 2012. He also served as Vice-President and Secretary/Treasurer from 2000 until he resigned in 2014. If you were ever able to attend them, you may remember him as the kind and happy-go-lucky personality 'Host' of the Oldtimers monthly luncheons and Christmas parties at the Hickory Inn in South Milwaukee and Joe's K Ranch in Cudahy.

He also served as the organizer/chairman of the Oldtimers Fireside Theatre outings until 2013. John put his "all" into serving the Bucyrus Oldtimers Association to help ensure its legacy would continue forward. He was a friend to everyone he ever met, and will be missed by family and our Oldtimers group.

Ever Hear of The Bucyrus Benefit Association?

Bucyrus has always been an advocate for employees before it was commonplace in industry. Before accident, sickness, and hospital insurance were available, Bucyrus employees had the option to join the Bucyrus Benefit Association. Started in 1926, members paid a monthly fee to belong, and should they suffer an accident or illness, the Association would help cover bills and pay employees an allowance while out of work. Bucyrus matched 25% of the dues collected by the Association.

Total dues and interest received in 1938 was \$12,746 and total benefits paid were \$12,217. The Association made a profit \$528 for the year. Volunteers staffed the 8 Officer and Director positions for the benefit of employees, and they even had their own logo! This was the first profitable year since the Association added a hospital plan. A very progressive program, especially for starting right before, and continuing through, the Great Depression.





Evel Knievel, Atlas Chain, And Missing Cranes

What brought the world-famous motorcycle daredevil, Evel Knievel, to Bucyrus-Erie in South Milwaukee? When and why did Bucyrus-Erie buy a chain manufacturer, and how does this all tie together? If you're ready to find out more about how these unlikely connections between two companies and a famous showman came about, keep reading.

It all starts with the popular BE Blasthole Drills. Being the most productive and reliable drilling machines in the late 60's, they sold very well. So well in fact, that there were times we had difficulty keeping up with making shipments. The demand strained our production shops and the vendor supply pipeline. The heavy-duty roller chains we purchased, used for hoist pulldown and propel motions, were very critical for completion of the machines. These chains look just like oversize bicycle chains. The chains transfer the power for the up and down movement of the drill gearcase. They're also the connection that powers the crawlers to move the machine. We tried various chain vendors to help us with supply, however most found the application on BE machines too severe for their chains, and we often experienced a higher than acceptable failure rate in the field.

For now, we'll take a parallel path in time to understand the beginning of an up-and-coming daredevil hero, Evel Knievel. After working odd jobs as a laborer in construction and mining, he joined a motocross

race circuit in 1962 to support his family, but crashed early on and broke his collar bone and shoulder during a race. He loved motorcycles, could no longer race, so he decided to open his own Honda dealership while he was healing. But that did not work out well for him and his dealership soon closed. He quickly found work selling for another motorcycle dealer, and while there, showed off his skills to potential buyers doing wheelies and tricks on the new bikes. These skills eventually led him to do his very first 'jump' over of a 20' long wooden box filled with rattlesnakes at a local show promoted by the dealer. The crowd loved it, and spurred him to selfpromote his way to regular appearances doing jumps and tricks in the local area where he gained notoriety as a 'motorcycle daredevil'. With each successful jump, he wanted to go bigger and jump one more crate, car, or bike. On March 25, 1967, Knievel cleared 15 cars at Ascot Park in Gardena, California.

Then, on New Years Eve of 1967, Evel Knievel became a legendary daredevil celebrity overnight by attempting to jump the fountains at Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas in a delayed broadcast televised event. Although he crashed, and the story made sensational headlines and facilitated broad promotion his show skills nationally and internationally. Evel received even more national exposure on March 18, 1968, when comedian and latenight talk show host Joey Bishop had him on as a guest of ABC's The Joey Bishop Show. Always the showman and self-promoter, he started a rumor that he was going to jump the Grand Canyon right after his live television appearance.

Throughout his early stunt career, Evel had one recurring problem with all the Norton, Honda, Triumph, and Harley-Davidson motorcycles he used for jumping- it was breaking chains. He started working with a manufacturer in Pennsylvania, Atlas Chain & Precision Products, to develop reliable chains for his bikes. They eventually got a design that worked, but in the process, he tallied a large bill for the R&D and manufacturing work he directed Atlas to do.

Jumping back (no pun intended) to BE's chain problems. Although the Atlas chains were best suited for the BE drills, Atlas could not commit to producing the required amount chain for Bucyrus-Erie with the other contracts they had. After a few months of negotiations in late 1967, BE President Gene Berg closed a deal to acquire Atlas in January of 1968. The intent was to use it primarily as the sole chain supplier for BE's roller chain demands. The Atlas company assets and inventory was part of Bucyrus' purchase deal, along with the list of payables and debtors. And one of those debtors on the list was Evel Knievel, who had fallen behind on his invoices.

Evel had been trying to find ways to settle his debt, and after no success with Atlas, BE was a game changer for him. He approached BE with Atlas representatives and asked if BE would like him to do some personal appearances promoting machines in exchange for the balance due. By then he had significant celebrity status, and an exchange deal was eventually worked out in 1971 with Fred Shew, General Sales Manager of the Construction Machinery Division during his first visit to South Milwaukee. Evel subsequently appeared at several mining and construction machine trade shows for BE, which brought show visitors to the company booth just to see him in person or get an autograph.

As Evel gained popularity, he persisted in spreading his rumor about a Grand Canyon jump. He had applied several times for permits, but in late 1971 he was permanently barred by the Federal Government from ever trying to jump across the Grand Canyon. His focus moved to Idaho and the Snake River Canyon, where he leased 35 acres of private land for \$35,000, and promoted a Snake River Canyon Jump targeted for September 4, 1974.

He spent the next few years getting the necessary engineering completed for the steam powered rocket Skycycle, having it built, and gathering the necessary equipment he would need to pull off the greatest daredevil stunt of all time. He still owed Bucyrus, so in the mix of preparations he agreed to purchase and use two Bucyrus Erie cranes for the jump; a 40C Freedom Crane and a 55C long range crane. As part of the lowcost deal, he would promote the BE machines, and BE would supply training, support, and operators for the jump at no extra charge. BE employees John Hollingsworth and Claude Robichaud were assigned to the promotion and built a special bosun's chair adorned with large BE logos to use when the 40C lifted him into the Skycycle. There was a rumor after the jump attempt that OSHA had fined BE using the chair as not being safe to use to move a person. We could never find any indication that ever happened. The larger 55C would position the launch ramp and load the Skycycle on the launch rail. It would also become the rescue crane after the attempt failed.

Evel made his second and last visit to BE on October 25, 1973 to meet with Fred Shew, and Bob Smith, Sales Manager, CMD to work out the final details on the jump and deal with BE. He arrived in South Milwaukee with his gold crowned walking stick in a customized gunmetal gray Cadillac station wagon with a Montana license plate reading: BIG SKY COUNTRY EVEL.

Almost one year later, on September 8, 1974, Bucyrus' Hollingsworth and Robichaud were on site operating the cranes and providing support. At 3:36 p.m. MDT the water that powered the Skycycle engine was superheated into steam reached a temperature of 500° Fahrenheit, and it was launched. During take-off, the drogue parachute prematurely deployed as the Skycycle left the launch rail. The Skycycle suffered significant drag from the dangling parachute, and even though it made it across the north rim of the canyon, the prevailing northwest wind caused it to drift backward. By the time it hit the bottom of the canyon, it landed only a few feet from the water on the south side of the canyon from which it had been launched. Evel Knievel was subsequently rescued and brought up the cliff face to the launch area using the BE 55C crane.

The iconic red bosun's chair with the BE logo eventually found its way back to the Evansville plant where it was made. Bucyrus-Erie customers, guests, visitors, and even employees would sit in it to have their picture taken. Nobody is sure what ever became of it. Evel would only do one more trade show for BE after the Snake River Canyon jump. His deal for the two cranes fell into arrears over the course of time as he moved on with his jumps, shows, and promotions. The 40C was eventually located and repossessed. The whereabout of the 55C crane was never determined, and in the end the debt was written off.

Thanks to Fred Shew and Ron Hargrave for providing some of the finer details to this unusual story. We're always amazed at what we learn about the company's history, connections, and deals.




The Gun Shop

When the US entered WWII, 21% of the male workers in South Milwaukee were drafted or enlisted in the military. Women quickly stepped in to fill those roles, and Bucyrus-Erie's production switched to goods that supported the war effort. About 80% of all production was for extraction of raw materials, machines purchased by the US Government, and specialty items dedicated to the effort. Bucyrus cast and machined the top and bottom of thousands of large shells. One unique product we made was the mounting trailers (caissons) for the 240MM Howitzer guns. We also assembled quite a few of them in the South Milwaukee plant. The name for

the area used for production and assembly of these switched from the fab shop to the gun shop. However, the war did not seem to slow down the social/sports activities at Bucyrus. Don Kanter recently gave us a newspaper clipping from The Milwaukee Journal on July 29, 1943 listing the Bucyrus-Erie SM Plant Baseball teams standings with the 'Gun Shop' as one of them. We're not sure when the gun shop name disappeared and reverted back to fab, but it's an interesting look at how Bucyrus-Erie manufacturing shops adapted to our country's needs at the time.



Bucyrus Watch Fobs

One of our long-term goals for the museum is to be able to display a complete set of company issued watch fobs. They were used for promotions There are 46 Bucyrus and Bucyrus Erie fobs defined in the Hoover's Watch Fob Guide Book published in the 1960's. We have identified 51 different fobs in all, and were missing 7 of them. Bob Jelinek recently attended the International Watch Fob Collectors show in Cleveland, OH and found several of the missing ones. We only have 3 more to find to complete our permanent collecAtion.

This was one of the missing fobs acquired, issued for the 1924 annual company picnic at the South Milwaukee Plant. These "Picnic Fobs" were also issued for the Evansville, IN plant with their picnic date and location on the back. The fob and ribbon pinned to your shirt and served as your ticket to get food and drinks. You were also provided with a leather strap to put the fob on after the event, so not many of the ribbon and pin versions survived. This one is especially interesting since it was issued to a member of the Bucyrus Picnic Committee. We can't imagine more than 20-24 people were on the committee, so this is indeed a very rare find. We'll be taking steps to preserve the ribbon from further deterioration and get it ready for display. We're currently planning how best to display all 51 of them together. In the meantime, you can see the fobs we have now in various cases throughout the museum when you visit.
