It all started in October of 1976 when Jack Carr and Louis Veltze hired me for a service position in the South Cone. I arrived alone in Milwaukee, no family allowed, since I was to travel with BE for three months of training. I had left my job the Chuquicamata-Chile mine to take the position with BE, along with a 30% salary cut. I was young, always loved everything about the USA, and thought it would be good for my family, especially for my kid's future.

Instead of training, I was immediately sent to Hibbing Minnesota to replace Jim Letrell, who was taking one week vacation. Well, Jim never came back to this job, and I was left to finish modification to some 295B shovels to fix structural problems by myself.

I decided to move my family to America on my own, and completed several erection jobs all around the country, taking my family with me to everywhere I was sent. Well, the promised training never came, and I was never sent back to Chile to cover that service position I was hired for! Every time my wife would ask Louis Veltze about the promise to send me back to Chile, Louis would respond "Promesas que no se cumplen" (Unfulfilled promises).

Yes, it was fun moving around so many places in the US, with the whole family, but of course, there were some not to pleasant times, such as when we were robbed of a complete month of salary in Amarillo, Texas, on our way to Milwaukee from Silver City. Then there was the time I had an emergency surgery at a mine in Peru, and right after went on to make an Acutrol presentation to the relief of Tom Nelson who was trying to entertain the audience while I was having surgery!

The worst was the discrimination I suffered was in Texas, when my ability to

build a 2570W Dragline was questioned because of my Latin last name. "We do not want a Mexican building our dragline" said one of the customer's executives. But Bucyrus-Erie stood behind me. Louis Veltze arrived to talk to the customer who reluctantly agreed to give me the chance to prove what I was able to do. Walter Palmer was my "Field Mentor" on this adventure. This story had a happy ending when that same executive requested BE let me stay in Texas for the erection of their second dragline. It felt good!

However, my boss had a different idea and promoted me to Service Supervisor based in South Milwaukee. When that was announced, that same executive offered me a supervisor job with his company overseeing their two draglines and other equipment! That felt so good, but I remained loyal to BE and moved to South Milwaukee instead.

I first served as Electrical Service Supervisor, then of Prototype machines. I was frequently sent to accompany the salespeople to make the presentation of our new Bucyrus-Siemens Acutrol A/C Drive System.

Because of traveling with salespeople like Louis Perichone, Tom Nelson, Dean Johnson, and others, I was offered a position in the Sales Department with another pay cut, but this time only 10%.

I accepted this new challenge and had good success increasing new machine and parts sales in my assigned territory. There were no commissions on sales, but there was a bonus for up to 5 month's salary if the lofty sales goal was met. I was awarded the extra salary plus several other prizes for training and service sales, that included my very first computer – all in my first year in the sales department!

And the good life in sales continued with my promotion first to Worldwide

Electric Sales Manager, and then to a similar position but for Electric Mining Shovels. Kathy Knoll was a great support during my stay in Milwaukee. Those were my best years at BE, working under John Westerman, Tim Sullivan, Bill Winter, and Phill Mork. We sold a lot of equipment, and I even got a scholarship to get my MBA at the UWM, which I believe was the only one ever awarded by Bucyrus.

Then things got difficult, the company went into chapter 11, Bill Winter left and was replaced by Frank Miller who was hired to restructure the company. He significantly changed the entire organization and, in my opinion, it was disastrous. To me it did not represent the spirit of Bucyrus-Erie, but it was probably necessary to keep the company alive.

Those changes included elimination of my position as Manager Electric Mining Shovels, and I was assigned to some temporary jobs. Then an unsolicited offer came to oversee the Svedala operation in Chile. It was an excellent opportunity from a personal standpoint because it gave me the opportunity to return home to Chile, something that was always in the back of my mind. Unfortunately, we found out that we were not happy in Chile, with our son and daughter still back in the US, we did not like living in Santiago. So, after two years, we returned to the US where I was hired by ASTEC as Vice President of International Sales.

My years with ASTEC were very successful, increasing international sales from under \$10 M in 2000, to \$138 M when I retired in 2011. Now we live happily retired In Pembroke Pines Florida, but we will never forget our wonderful years with BE and the many people that mentored and helped me. I am very grateful that Bucyrus-Erie made our move to this wonderful country possible.

New 3850B Model Arrives

It's finally arrived! Master model builder Ken Fisher and his wife Mindy were in the Bucyrus Museum on March 1st, assembling a long-awaited scratch built 1:87 scale model of the famous Bucyrus Erie 3850B purchased by Peabody Coal in 1960. They traveled here all the way from Fairbanks, Alaska where Ken is a gold mining heavy equipment operator. The 3850B given the name 'Big Hog' by the mine, and was the world's largest shovel when it went to work at the Sinclair Mine in Kentucky. We're really honored to add this wonderful model to our permanent collection.

Ken first contacted us last year and wanted to donate an iconic model to the museum. Ken's model building skills are outstanding, and his work and attention to detail is noted as world class by his peers. This 3850B stripping

shovel model revolves and has working crowd and hoist motions, and the dipper door even latches just like the real one. Also on board are a complete set of functioning nighttime operating and undercarriage lights! It took Ken several hundred hours to research the design and over 300 hours to build. Except for the 3D printed track links and handrails, Ken hand fabricated the entire machine from styrene, brass, springs, wood.

Ken also provided us with a set of photographs documenting the build and its progress over the course of several months. He designed it to be able to transport it in sections, so final assembly could be completed at the museum. The engineered sections

were carefully packed in two suitcases that Ken and Mindy transported to Milwaukee as 'carry-ons', while their personal items flew as checked bags. That's dedication!

We cannot thank him enough for taking time to build and deliver this impressive piece of Bucyrus equipment history and donating it to the museum. It was certainly a pleasure for us to meet them in per-

son and watch him work for more than 5 hours doing the final assembly and reaving the digging cables and attaching the boom suspension lines.

It's now on permanent display in our stripping shovel case with our 1850B 'Big Brutus' and 6360 'Captain' models for our visitors to see. We're sure this trio of giants will and will be the topic of many discussions with our guests. Thanks again Ken and Mindy for your generous support of the museum!


We have the 2 dragline and the stripping shovel



"New" 1960's BE Logo Sign

Owners of Weiss Brothers Replicas, Milo and Charles Wiess of Sheboygan, Wisconsin presented the museum with a spectacular 96" wide A-Frame BE logo sign. The famous red and yellow block B and E letters with Bucyrus-Erie Company splitting them is now proudly hanging on the museum's 'sign wall'.

This iconic logo was only used for a couple of years, before it was morphed into the classic B-E square logo. It adorned several of the largest B-E stripping shovels ever built, like the 1850B, 1950B's and the two largest stripping shovels built by Bucyrus-Erie, the 3850B's before being phased out. This sign completes our Bucyrus and Bucyrus-Erie logo examples for the museum, and helps us to fully explain the history of the company's marketing identity.

Milo and Charles are also currently working on resto-

ration of a 1930's 110B quarry shovel model that once was used by Bucyrus-Erie at trade and sales shows all over the world well into the 1940's. We're very excited to get this almost 100-year-old piece of company history restored and back into displayable condition. They've previously restored our 395B shovel model, our 301M shovel model, our 100T truck crane model, and scratch built the large scale 95C Panama Canal Railroad Steam Shovel in our Panama case. Also, they recently donated a white 1:50 scale Wiess Brother Taylor Fork Lift model complete with Bucyrus International logos for our 8750 Dragline display.
