After graduating from Waukesha High School in 1966, my dad suggested I apply for an apprenticeship at Bucyrus-Erie. He was the Fireman in the Heat Treat & Cleaning Room, just north of Rawson and I figured I could car pool with him. We lived near Dousman and Eagle which was a one-hour drive each way. I was one of 15 candidates for the 2-year apprenticeship which included college night courses. The first day was an experience, meeting other candidates and B-E's President, Gene Berg.

The apprenticeship was broken up into 9-week rotations in both the mining (MMD) and construction machinery divisions (CMD). Gene Zwolinski was the apprenticeship coordinator at that time. Each department was a great experience, we learned things not taught in high school. I leaned more toward the construction equipment division located in the old Dorman Shoe building which had hydronic heat that caused the heating pipes to bang loudly as the hot water would start flowing.

CMD consisted of backhoes, cranes, marine cranes, front end loaders and many more which I do not remember. After my apprenticeship, I settled down into the construction machine power plant section with Joe Plevak as the Project Engineer and Ted Pulles as my Supervisor. Since the Dorman Building was a few blocks from the main campus, we had a runner to take the revised drawings to the microfiche department twice daily.

My recollection of the Bucyrus Club was great. The 2nd floor had a basket-

ball court, stage, showers, and locker room. The 1st floor consisted of a lunch room, executive dining room, TV room, pool and billiard table room, and bowling lanes. No bar was there at the time. Lunches were great and at a reasonable cost.

The CMD, also had a Test Center in Demming, New Mexico which consisted of a small building, garage, and several acres of just bare land. My boss and I drove a U-Haul truck there filled with spare parts for a 30H backhoe. The ground was so hard (caliche) that the bucket teeth had to be replaced every 4 hours. I got to run the backhoe for 1 day of digging. It was here that I was introduced to real Mexican food, Road Runner birds, and rattle snakes. It was a trip I will never forget.

My life changed greatly when my dad, with a little help from my mother, decided to retire after 40 years with B-E. I was on my own at 19 and rented a room in a rooming house on Milwaukee Ave. My meals consisted of McDonalds, George Webb, Lloyd's Lunch, and the Bucyrus Club Cafeteria.

After a few years in the Dorman Building, CMD was moved to Sturtevant, WI on Hwy 11 in Racine County. This building was the "Taj Mahal" compared to the Dorman Building.

I eventually met the girl of my dreams and we married in September of 1969. On our way back from honeymooning in Tampa, Florida, we made a side trip to Zanesville, OH to see the "Big Muskie". It was not hard to find since it towered above the hills. Not sure that we were allowed to drive into the mining pit, but we did.

Several years later, The CMD was moved to Erie, PA. I had several trips to Erie on the company Lear, taking tours of the city, and looking at homes with the real estate broker. The company offered to pay for the move and provide com-


pensation toward payments. With much consideration, we decided not to make the move to Erie.

My 16 years with B-E were coming to a quick end, and jobs in 1982 were not easy to come by (Jimmy Carter era). After 9 months of being unemployed, I landed an engineering job in Menomonee Falls, WI. I had to take an engineering test and landed the job. After one year there, I moved to another engineering position in Waukesha, WI, spent 30 years there, and retired at 65.

The education and experience I received from Bucyrus-Erie had set the Engineering standard for my career and life.

Frank H. Sampson and His Panama Canal Legacy ___

Frank Sampson was a man with a thirst for adventure and innovation. Born in Milwaukee in 1885, Frank's early years were spent dreaming of mechanical wonders and adventures that stretched beyond the Lake Michigan horizon. His interests led him to Bucyrus Steam Shovel and Dredge Company who were synonymous with pioneering construction equipment. It was here that Frank's skills would be tested and honed for a historic challenge that awaited him nearly 4,000 miles away.

In early 1904, the United States embarked on an ambitious project to construct the Panama Canal—a monumental feat that would connect the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, revolutionizing global maritime trade. The project was daunting: a 50-mile swath of jungle, rife with disease, and plagued by natural obstacles. Bucyrus ultimately provided 75% of the heavy-duty steam powered equipment crucial for the canal's excavation. The seventy-seven steam shovels, four railroad wrecking cranes, three 15 cu/yd dredges, and one steam powered pile driver instrumental in moving the enormous quantities of earth required to forge the canal's path were all manufactured in South Milwaukee.

Frank, an apprentice field engineer, was tapped by Bucyrus to join the effort in Panama of assembling the new steam shovels for work on the canal. Frank brought with him a blend of grit and ingenuity typically needed for this type of work. Frank's expertise in assembling, maintaining, repairing, and operating these machines made him an invaluable asset to Bucyrus and the project.

Upon arriving in Panama in 1905, Frank instantly be-

came a very recognizable character. Tall and lean with a big mustache, he always wore full length engineer boots and a wide brim hat. He was awestruck by the sheer scale and complexity of the task at hand. The tropical heat was oppressive and the work conditions were brutal. The Isthmian Canal Commission, headed by Chief Engineer George W. Goethals, faced relentless challenges ranging from landslides to yellow fever outbreaks. Yet, Frank was determined that he could endure the rigors of such an undertaking, and help Bucyrus' machines to play a key role in the success of the project.

The canal project was being worked in two directions with plans to have the cuts "meet in the middle". Frank's days were spent amidst the noise of steam shovels, overburden trains, and dynamite blasts on both fronts. Each day, he would try to meticulously inspect the

shovels, ensuring they were in optimal condition to handle the grueling workload. Of course, there were always breakdowns and regular landslides that would damage the machines. His job then became lead repair man to fix and get machines back to work as quickly as possible. His deep knowledge of the machinery allowed him to troubleshoot issues on the fly, figure out the spare parts needs, and apply a "bush fix" to minimize downtime and keep the project on track.

As time and the project went on, Frank quickly developed direct contact with the factory, filing weekly reports and requesting parts needed to repair and back up the variety of equipment Bucyrus had working. He even had his own return address stamp for correspondence, something reserved only for executives back in the day. We have an example of one of his envelopes on display in the Bucyrus Museum.

One of Frank's notable contributions was his role in the excavation of the Culebra Cut, a crucial segment of the canal that involved slicing through the continental divide. The cut was notorious for its instability, with frequent landslides threatening to undo months of progress. Frank's problem-solving skills were put to the test as he worked alongside a diverse team of engineers and laborers from around the world. His innovative techniques for suggesting digging patterns to stabilize the cut earned him respect and recognition among the US Government engineers leading the project.

Despite the physical and mental toll, Frank found moments of respite in the camaraderie of his fellow workers. Evenings were spent sharing stories and laughter under the starlit sky, a brief escape from the relentless demands of the project. Frank's unwavering spirit and dedication inspired those around him, fostering a sense of unity and shared purpose.

By the end of 1913, the Panama Canal was nearing completion and Frank returned to Bucyrus. He had spent eight years on the project, and was well respected by the other teams of engineers and geologists that were working on the project. Frank Sampson had gone from rookie field engineer to playing a pivotal role in its success. His contributions to the project extended beyond the machinery and his technical skills; they embodied the very essence of human perseverance and ingenuity.

On August 15, 1914, the Panama Canal was officially opened, marking a new era in global commerce. Frank returned for the opening and stood among the crowd of dignitaries and workers, watching with pride as the SS Ancon made its historic passage through the canal. The completion of the canal was not just a triumph of engineering; it was a testament to the collaborative efforts of individuals like Frank, whose passion and expertise had bridged oceans and reshaped the world.

Even after he resumed his work with Bucyrus, the Panama Canal remained a defining chapter in his life. He shared his experiences with future generations, his stories rich with detail and underscored by the lessons of determination and innovation. Frank's legacy, like the canal itself, stood as a symbol of what could be achieved when vision, skill, and tenacity converged.


27th Annual Bucyrus Erie Picnic Fun _

There was a long list of games and prizes awarded at the 1931 company picnic held at Waukesha Beach on Saturday, August 8th. The lineup included 2 softball games, an archery contest, raw egg toss, 3 bands to entertain and dance to, and 15 cash awards totaling \$100.00 to be given away.

Kids events included Turf Races, two-in-one sack races, and centipede races with 5 kids to a team. There was a sawdust scramble for kids under 12 and the prizes were pennies, peanuts, and candy kisses. Each child of an employee also received 4 ride tickets for the amusement park located near the beach.

One of the most unusual games was "Tilting"- a stationary jousting game whereby contestants stood on a platform and tried to knock their opponent off using a long pole with a semi-padded ball of rags attached to one end. Steve Galweski of South Milwaukee donated pictures to the Bucyrus Museum of his grandfather, Sylvester Lofy, in the title match, which he eventually won. The grand prize for tilting that day was a bathing suit!

Sylvester started at Bucyrus in 1916 as an 'errand boy' and went on to work as a machinist for more than 40 years. His machining career began as a shaper operator in what is now the Bucyrus Club. The West Machine Shop occupied the space that eventually became the BE Club Bowling Alleys until 1919. He was

an accomplished bowler whose 768 series record stood at the top for 16 years at the Club.

I doubt tilting would be a sanctioned company activity in current times, but was probably a blast back in the day. Sylvester's son, Richard, also worked for Bucyrus Erie in purchasing for many years. Thanks for sharing these Steve!
